SUBMITS THE FOLLOWING BILL FOR
CONSIDERATION; WHICH WAS HELD AT THE DESK.

A BILL TO

Establish areas where firearms are prohibited, persons
who are prohibited from carrying a firearm, establishing a
licensure system, rules and regulations in respect to
firearms, and definitions.

TABLE OF PROVISIONS.

SECTION 1.	TITLE.
SECTION 2.	AREAS PROHIBITED.
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BE IT ENACTED *by this House of Commons with the advice and consent of the same, as follows:*

1 **SECTION 1. Title.**

2 This Act may be cited as “The Firearm Regulation Act.”

3 **SECTION 2. Areas prohibited.**

4 (a) Firearms shall be prohibited on House of Commons
5 property, except in:

6 (1) a locked compartment in the garage; or

7 (2) in a locked motor vehicle.

8 (b) CONCEAL CARRY.—It shall be unlawful for any
9 person to conceal themselves carrying a firearm,
10 regardless of its lawful possession.

11 **SECTION 3. Persons prohibited.**

12 (a) GENERALLY.—Anyone who:

13 (1) has a mental illness;

14 (2) is below the age of 21;

15 (3) is above the age of 85; or

16 (4) does not have a license issued as described in §
17 4 of this Act;

18 shall be prohibited from possessing a firearm.

19 **SECTION 4. Licensure.**

20 (a) Any persons who wish to possess a firearm within the
21 confinements of § 2 of this Act must have a license issued
22 by the Office of the Inspector General.

23 (b) The license must include:

24 (1) a photograph of the individual requesting the
25 license;

26 (2) a date issued by the Office of the Inspector
27 General;

28 (3) a date of expiration, which shall be either:

29 (A) five (5) years from the date of issuance; or

30 (B) when the individual is above the age of
31 85, whichever comes first; and

32 (4) the reason for the need for the firearm.

33 (c) REVOCATION OF LICENSE.—The Inspector General
34 may, at any time, demand the revocation of a license
35 which shall require the approval of the Speaker of the
36 House for just reasons on the grounds that the licensure
37 may harm themselves or others.

38 (1) The license may be re-instated if the Speaker
39 and the Health Advisor of the House concur in
40 judgment that the individual is fit to be re-instated.

41 (2) APPEAL.—An individual with a license revoked
42 may appeal should the license not be re-instated
43 within seventy-two (72) hours from the time of
44 revocation by filing an administrative complaint
45 against The Office of the Inspector General under
46 HCC § 2-2-9.

47 (d) APPLICATION FOR LICENSE.—A person must
48 apply for a license prior to the possession of a firearm on
49 House of Commons property.

50 (1) Each firearm the person purchases must be
51 registered with the Office of the Inspector General.

52 (e) BACKGROUND CHECK.—The Office of the Inspector
53 General shall conduct all necessary background checks
54 and may prohibit certain types of people with a criminal
55 past from being issued a license.

56 (f) PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN TYPES OF
57 FIREARMS.—The Inspector General may impose bans on
58 certain types of firearms as they see fit.

59 (g) CARRY AND SHOWING.—All license holders must
60 have their license on them at all times and must be
61 presented by demand of an Official of the House.

62 (h) FILING FEES.—The Office of the Inspector General
63 may impose filing fees as they deem necessary and
64 appropriate.

65 **SECTION 5. Definitions.**

66 “*Firearm.*”—

67 (1) any weapon (including a starter gun) which will
68 or is designed to or may readily be converted to
69 expel a projectile by the action of an explosive;

70 (2) the frame or received of any such weapon;

71 (3) any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; or

72 (4) any destructive device, excluding antique
73 firearms.
